DISTRICT 21 PRESIDENT Rosemary Cammaert

Who can become a member of RTOERO?

RTOERO was established in 1968 by a group of retired teachers in Ontario in order to protect their pensions. RTOERO members came from the public education systems across Ontario.

Today, RTOERO has 51 Districts, 5 of which are located outside of Ontario, one in Quebec, one representing the Atlantic provinces, one representing members in the Prairies, one for Vancouver Island and one for mainland B.C. There are also two French language districts in Ontario (EstaRio and Region du ciel blue).

RTOERO membership is open to all involved in education from Early Childhood Education through to Colleges and Universities. Membership is open to those who greet us at the door, those working in the classroom (including EA's), and those who keep our schools clean.

An employed educator, who is nearing or considering retirement, may apply to become a RTOERO member.

What does RTOERO do for members?

I am sure many answered with: A great Insurance Benefits package; health, travel, home and car options available.

We also have available to us a program called Best Doctors. It provides 5 types of services: Expert medical opinion, FindBest Doc, FindBest Care, Best Doctors 360 and the Medical Records eSummary.

Venngo is a service offered which provides discounts in many retail sectors across Canada. It has been noted that this service is used by those who travel or live/work/shop in our larger urban areas.

What does RTOERO do for our communities?

RTOERO's Strategic Plan-Vibrant Voices has established 3 areas of concern-Seniors Strategy, Geriatric Health Care and Environmental Stewardship. Each District asked to choose one area to advocate in their District. To that end District 21's Political Advocacy Committee is working on ideas to support those of us aging at home. They have had a couple of meetings (via zoom) and I am sure we will be receiving ideas from them on how each of us can help out in this initiative.

Several years ago the **RTOERO Foundation** was established. It continues to support the research & training in the field of geriatric medicine. Throughout the last year it has supported us with suggestions to help us get through this pandemic while encouraging support for all seniors, whether they live alone in their own homes or in a LTC community.

RTOERO assists Districts in supporting not for profit community organizations which help older adults. Until last year it gave out **S**ervice **T**o **O**thers (STO) grants to districts who applied and met the criteria established.

HEALTH BENEFITS REPORT Elaine Turner

It gives me great pleasure to inform members that our RTOERO elected board of directors used the surplus from 2020 to reduce the 2021 premiums by 3% in each of the 3 plans namely, Hospital and Convalescent Care, Extended Health Care and Dental Care. This reduction was based on recommendations from the Benefits Committee. The Health Benefits book which is published but every 3 years is always available on line at https://rtoero.ca

A week ago, I received notice that Vengo Member Perks is now available to all RTOERO members. Up until now, the savings program was included for members who also had RTOERO extended health coverage. Please note that new participants will need their RTOERO membership ID to activate membership. Then members can visit the Vengo Member Perks and start browsing for savings. One can also download the Vengo app from the app store on their phone. If you have friends who are not retired yet and who work in education, they can join now for free.



POLITICAL ADVOCACY COMMITTEE (PAC) Jacqueline Asselin - Chair

This committee is currently chaired by Jacqueline Asselin and three members, Elaine Turner, Anne Guest, and Gus Cammaert. The Committee is focused on aging in place and has currently set two priorities:

- 1.SHSM (Specialist High Skills Major) This is a program offered in colleges and high schools to develop Personal Support Workers to fill the needs of seniors in long-term care homes and support seniors aging at home. The program allows students to gain credits toward their Ontario Secondary School Diploma and focus their learning on a specific economic sector at the same time.
 - Letters were sent to the two Renfrew school boards to obtain information about the possibilities of offering courses at the high school level to help meet the present shortage of workers PSW field.
- 1. Transportation For seniors residing in rural communities, transportation becomes an issue for those who wish to continue to reside in their home but can no longer drive or don't have affordable access to transportation. We are currently investigating which services are available in Renfrew County and the cost of these services so the information can be passed on to our members.

The committee is also investigating what process is needed to get services in the home when needed. There is a lack of readily available information on how to access many of the services offered.

GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE Carol Sulpher, Chair, Past President

The governance committee met twice early in 2020 to complete its revision of the Governance Document (formerly called our Constitution) for Renfrew District 21, a task which it had begun in 2019. This work was done in order to align our district governance with the Canada Not for Profit Act. In March 2020, the Renfrew District 21 Executive passed a motion to forward the revised document to provincial office for its inspection. In May 2020 provincial office approved the revised District 21 governance document with only minor wording changes suggested. This made our new governance document our official mechanism for operating in our district. We look forward to more formally presenting our District Governance Document at a future District AGM in a post-COVID era.

One task remains for the governance committee, that being to rewrite our policies and procedures manual to align it with our revised governance document. This will have to wait until we are able to meet again in person.

Sincere thanks to members of the committee for their work to date: District 21 President Rosemary Cammaert, Communications Chair Gus Cammaert, President Unit 21-1 Myrtle Carroll, and Pension and Political Advocacy Chair Jacqueline Asselin.

COMMUNITY GRANT COMMITTEE Carol Sulpher, Chair, Past President

The Community Grant is a new initiative from provincial office whereby each district in RTOERO may recommend one community grant application to head office to receive \$2500 for its use. This grant replaces the Project Service to Others initiative where applications were always examined and approved by a provincial committee.

On March 15, 2021, the new District Community Grant Committee met by zoom to examine the two community grant applications received by the district executive. One application asked for \$2500 for the construction of memory boxes for the new long term care home being built in Arnprior. The second application requested a similar amount of money for the Killaloe Seniors' Centre.

Committee members agreed that both applications were highly deserving of being awarded the grant, since they were both congruent with the goals and values of RTOERO. It was a difficult decision to make. With that said, they made a recommendation to the District Executive that the application regarding the construction of memory boxes be the application that is forwarded to Toronto. At its April zoom meeting, the District executive approved this recommendation. The application has been forwarded to head office.
