

Medical Support Shelters



An overview and enhancement of the Medial Support Shelter plan was conducted Monday morning for state EPR staff. Nyssa Owen, Keilondria Robertson and others shared the existing structure for the plan that would have evacuees from the coast arriving at the Georgia Public Safety Training Center in Forsyth. Future sessions and an exercise in May are expected to result in further plan improvements.

State DHEART

The state DHEART team held a quarterly meeting Thursday, providing an overview of the group and future planning for all members. Chairs Veronda Griffin and Chris Owen talked about expanding agency involvement and the process of activating and deactivating the Emergency Operation Center. She said along with fiveyear strategic planning there are multiple major events to prepare for in the next two years.

Healthy Brain Initiative

Thanks to Connie Smith-Lindsey for bringing attention to Georgia's role in the national Healthy Brain Initiative. Be sure to check out the video summarizing the objectives, with word from Elizabeth Head, Deputy Director, Aging Health Manager:

This important initiative is intended to help public health departments and health communicators to educate about **dementia**, **detection**, **diagnosis**, **treatment**, **and care** at the community level. DPH is one of 43 health departments funded for the Healthy Brain Initiative (HBI) by CDC. The Alzheimer's Association and the National Association of County and City Health Officials have launched the third cohort of the <u>HBI Road Map Strategists</u>. This nationwide effort focuses on building public health capacity to address dementia at the local level. The Road Map Strategist program funds local health departments and tribal health organizations to better address brain health, dementia, and caregiving in their communities. **The awardees are:**

Tomato Vaccine

Last month we had international visitors from Uzbekistan visit the state DPH EOC. More recently we received this interesting information from the National Public Health Information Coalition in the weekly highlights report:

Edible Plant-Based Vaccine TOMAVAC Shows Promising Defense Against COVID-19

Scientists from Uzbekistan have unveiled a novel antiviral vaccine derived from a tomato plant and genetic vectors to fight against COVID-19. The innovative vaccine, named TOMAVAC, is distinct in that it can be consumed directly from the tomato plant.

Scientists created a transgenic tomato, TOMAVAC, which produces a key protein of the virus. Feeding mice with TOMAVAC resulted in a significant increase in virus-fighting antibodies in their blood and intestines. These antibodies showed 15-25% neutralizing activity against the virus. Initial trials in humans also demonstrated a steady increase in antibodies without severe side effects, suggesting TOMAVAC's safety and potential effectiveness. Read the study here.
